Continued Success through Program Quality Improvement



The implementation of the Learn Well grant has been instrumental in equipping SDQPI participants in nurturing all aspects of a child's development, aligning with SDCOE's mission to promote lifelong learning and well-being from the earliest stages of education.



PROFESSIONAL LEARNING

Ongoing professional learning and training equips educators with the latest research-based strategies in child development, curriculum, and inclusive teaching practices, ensuring they can meet the diverse needs of all learners. Training also enhances their ability to create engaging, nurturing environments that support cognitive, socialemotional, and language development.

Additionally, professional learning fosters career growth, job satisfaction, and workforce retention by empowering educators with the skills and confidence needed to excel in their roles. Investing in continuous training not only strengthens the early childhood workforce but also leads to better learning outcomes for children, setting the foundation for lifelong success.

COACHING

Through individualized guidance, feedback, and hands-on support, coaching helps early childhood educators refine their teaching strategies, implement best practices, and create nurturing, developmentally appropriate learning environments. Additionally, coaching fosters a culture of continuous learning and collaboration, empowering educators to address challenges, stay updated on research-based approaches, and improve overall program effectiveness.

Investing in coaching ensures that early learning and care programs provide highquality experiences that support children's success both in school and beyond.



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COLLEGE TUITION PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

The College Tuition Partnership Program was created to increase equitable access to college experience for early learning and care providers. Through funding from First 5 San Diego participants accessed college education leading to either Child Development permit attainment, advancement from the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing; or associate degree attainment in Child Development or Early Childhood Education. The program was designed to meet the diverse needs of participants at no cost to the student.
